Selection of Fondation Tany Meva as Regional Implementation Team for the Madagascar and Indian Ocean Islands Biodiversity Hotspot

Recommended Action Item

The Donor Council is asked to approve, on a no-objection basis, the selection of Fondation Tany Meva as the Regional Implementation Team (RIT) for the Madagascar and Indian Ocean Islands Biodiversity Hotspot.

The deadline for no-objection approval is **31 December 2014**.

Background

<u>Selection of the Regional Implementation Team for the Madagascar and Indian Ocean Islands</u> Biodiversity Hotspot

On 20 June 2014, CEPF requested that organizations interested in serving as the RIT submit an expression of interest by 17 July 2014 in order to pre-qualify to submit a formal proposal. Eight organizations submitted an expression of interest by the closing date, and were invited to submit full proposals. The RfP was released on 21 July 2014. The RfP placed the maximum value of proposals at \$1,500,000 as per the approved Spending Authority for this Strategic Direction in the Ecosystem Profile. Four organizations submitted valid proposals by the closing date of 14 September 2014: Biotope, Conservation International Madagascar, Fondation Tany Meva, and WIOMSA/BirdLife, a consortium of the Western Indian Ocean Marine Science Association and BirdLife International Africa Division. The CEPF Secretariat evaluated these proposals in October, and short-listed the top three applications. Interviews were conducted on 4 and 5 November with these top three applicants. Following the review and interviews, the Secretariat ranked Fondation Tany Meva first. The Secretariat then shared the full proposals and its evaluation summary with the Working Group.

On 11 December 2014, the Working Group met to discuss the assessment presented by the Secretariat. During the presentation, the Working Group expressed its satisfaction with the clarity and transparency of the review, and also indicated its full support for the assessment prepared by the Secretariat. The Working Group agreed to recommend to the Donor Council the selection of Fondation Tany Meva as RIT for the Madagascar and Indian Ocean Islands Biodiversity Hotspot, and authorized the Secretariat to begin negotiations with Fondation Tany Meva to resolve various issues.
