- 7. Countries or territories where project will be undertaken. The project will be implemented in Africa, Eastern Afro-montane region, South Western-Uganda, Bufundi sub county, Rubanda District.
- 8. Summary of the project.

The overall goal or long term impact of this project is a rural community fully empowered as change agents and champions of sustainable forest management and biodiversity conservation for the benefit of all.

#### **Specific objectives are:**

- Increased knowledge for local men and women about biodiversity and ecological values of Echuya forest and their 4Rs-(roles, rights, responsibilities and returns) to ensuring its sustainable management and conservation as a precondition to their human wellbeing.
- Sustainable management, harvesting practices and wise use of Yushaniaalpina bamboo at Echuya adopted.
- ☑ Bamboo regeneration and regrowth promoted at Echuya.
- ☑ Increased capacity of KIWOCEDU to effectively and strategically implement 'conservation for livelihood' projects with integration of gender issues.

### The main project results will be:

- Enhanced understanding of project stakeholders on CORB project; sustainable forest management, and gender issues in ensuring sustainable conservation of natural resources.
- KIWOCEDU's website operational and Information communication materials on sustainable forest management practices developed distributed to project stakeholders and beneficiaries.
- ☑ Increased skills and knowledge for at least 270 community members in sustainable harvesting of forest bamboos and value addition to bamboo products as part of wise use of natural resources.
- ☑ 50 hectares of bamboo forest brought under sustainable forest management regime.
- ☑ 1.5 hectares of degraded area at Echuya enriched with 1667 bamboo rhizomes (bamboo domestication) as an approach to forest restoration.
- KIWOCEDU and partners' skills, learning and knowledge sharing facilitated and enhanced through joint project monitoring, reporting and planning, and sharing of lessons learned.

The project will be implemented in Echuya Central Forest Reserve, located in Rubanda and Kisoro districts, south western Uganda. Key beneficiaries are forest adjacent communities and National Forestry Authority (NFA). Main Implementing partners will be NFA, Bufundi Echuya Forest Conservation and Livelihood Improvement (BECLA), and Rubanda Local Government.

Project duration and cost: 14 months, 1 August 2018-30<sup>th</sup> September 2019 **Total budget**: USD 30,000.

- The site for bamboo restoration is covered with short grass and shrubs, overgrazed and over bamboo harvested area. It's an open area with almost no bamboo stands. The site from where to uproot bamboo rhizomes for transplanting has high concentration of bamboo.

Demarcation of 1.5ha.of land to be restored	Selected BECLA CFM members will do the demarcation with technical guidance and supervision from NFA Manager and supervisor.

Pitting	Spot pitting will be done by selected BECLA members under and KIWOCEDU and NFA's supervision
Uprooting bamboo rhizomes	This will be selectively done at different spots by skilled selected CFM members, and under technical guidance form KIWOCEDU and NFA
Planting of 1667 bamboo rhizomes	This will be done in the dug pits by selected and oriented BECLA members with technical guidance form KIWOCEDU and NFA
Periodic <b>maintenance</b> of the restored area	Spot slashing and weeding around the planted bamboos will be done periodically as and when required to promote healthy bamboo establishment and growth.
Develop a joint management plan for the 1.5 bamboo restored area	During, joint planning meeting for this activity, a team comprised of representatives of the three parties will be selected to draft the joint management plan

Joint meeting will be held to review and agree on the joint plan before its operationalization.

- KIWOCEDU team had a meeting with NFA Manager-Mr. Martin Mwodi to discuss the call for LOI. The LOI was there after developed with consent, ideas, and information from the Manager, in regard to the proposed CORB project.
- Zoreka Keresi (KIWOCEDU staff) as a conservationist expert who has long served at Echuya was also involved in development of the LOI and other attachments as required by CEPF.
- CFM leaders were also consulted on the possible viable and community driven solutions to the bamboo issues at Echuya and the proposed activities were bamboo restoration and liberation as planned in the CORB project.
