II. OPENING REMARKS

Over the past three years we have worked to summarize the existing knowledge of the amphibians of the Eastern Arc and Coastal Forests of Tanzania and Kenya in the form of a field guide. Simultaneously, new amphibian species continued to be discovered and major taxonomic revisions resulted in entire genera being re-named and moved into other families. With the help of many colleagues we have published a 320 page book that includes species accounts for 122 amphibian species and 123 color photographs. The entire guide is written in both English and Kiswahili, making it accessible to a broad audience.

III. NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. What was the initial objective of this project?

The primary objective of our project was to expand the coverage of our web-based field guide of the amphibians of the East Usambara Mountains to cover a larger geographic area and to make this information readily accessible to a broad audience by including text in both English and Kiswahili.

2. Did the objectives of your project change during implementation? If so, please explain why and how.

The objectives of our project did not change during implementation; however the scope of the project expanded as several new amphibian species were discovered and major taxonomic revisions were made during the process of writing the guide.

3. How was your project successful in achieving the expected objectives?

The field guide has been completed and published. It is currently being distributed in East Africa by Camerapix International. The 320 page book includes species accounts for 122 amphibian species. Each account includes common names, a physical description, similar species, habitat, natural history, call, distribution, type locality, elevation range and conservation status. We also included range maps for each species and 123 color photos. Introductory sections of the book describe the Eastern Arc Mountains and Coastal Forests, amphibian habitat types, the history of amphibian studies in the region, the conservation status of amphibians, and methods for identifying amphibians in the field. The entire guide was translated into Swahili.

4. Did your team experience any disappointments or failures during implementation? If so, please explain and comment on how the team addressed these disappointments and/or failures.

Fortunately, we were able to overcome the challenges we faced during the implementation of the project. It was difficult to find a publisher who was willing to publish such a geographically specific field guide within our budget. It was also a challenge to find a publisher willing to edit and print text in both English and Kiswahili. The greatest challenge was ensuring that the most accurate and up to date information was used in the guide. This would not have been possible without the generosity and collegiality of the many herpetologists working in the region.

5. Describe any positive or negative lessons learned from this project that would be useful to share with other organizations interested in implementing a similar project.

When finding a publisher it is important to know where they plan to distribute the book to ensure that it will be readily available to the appropriate target audience. It was challenging but worthwhile to find a publisher based in Kenya that distributes books primarily within East Africa.

6. Describe any follow-up activities related to this project.

We are currently working on a list of people and institutions that will receive the limited number of free copies of the guide.

7. Please provide any additional information to assist CEPF in understanding any other aspects of your completed project.

New amphibian species continue to be discovered in the Eastern Arc and Coastal Forests, many of which have yet to be formally described or given scientific names. We hope to maintain a website that can function as a dynamic supplement to the published guide, summarizing new data as they become available.
