The Lake Tanganyika Authority (LTA) co-convened the African Great Lakes Conference (AGLC) alongside The Nature Conservancy (TNC). As a co-convener, LTA was involved in all aspects of conference development from conceptualization to participation in the Conference Organizing Committee (COC) and Technical Committee (TC). LTA helped advise and administer: selection of the location and conference themes, engagement of conference champions to promote attendance and understanding of the transboundary issues the conference aimed to address, and design of a robust conference program that engaged expert speakers and participants from every lake basin. Having an in-region lake authority as a co-convener was important in ensuring local ownership and mitigating the risk of the perception that conference was strictly a US or NGO-led project rather than a local priority.

The COC provided leadership on the conference title and themes, structure, location, desired outputs, and helped define the processes through which the conference came together with strong devolution of ownership to COC and TC members. Describe the success or challenges of the project toward achieving its short-term and long-term impact objectives

All of the intended short- and long-term impacts of the project were either met or are in process. Highlights of successes include:

- As detailed above, the AGLC successfully convened stakeholder from 34 countries including all AGLR nations for the first time in nearly two decades. Local ownership of the conference process and outcomes was strong and facilitated by the intentional devolvement of many details of the conference design to the COC and TC.
- The conference produced a set of consensus resolutions that define priorities for advancing conservation and sustainable development in the region through relationships, information-sharing, and tools launched or strengthened through the conference.
- The public launch during the conference of the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund, supported by the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation and administered by TNC, generated energy and additional intent to carry forward the conservation resolutions and deepen transboundary collaboration, information-sharing, and problem solving.
- The web-based information-sharing platform was publicly launched and demonstrated to the wide audience gathered at the conference, and the upcoming African Great Lakes Conservation Fund ensures that there will be continued investment in updating and improving the site and outreach to ensure its application in informing resource management across the region.

A few challenges and/or delays include:

- We do not yet have specific commitments by more than half of COC members to continue engaging in one or more groups to collaboratively address transboundary conservation issues, though we are well on the way. What we can say at this time is that a subset of both COC and TC members will continue to be part of the process of collaboratively addressing transboundary conservation issues of the African Great Lakes in a variety of ways. For example, some have joined the Advisory Committee for the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund and will help guide selection of projects to be awarded grants in 2018-2020 for work that addresses priorities articulated in the conference resolutions. Others are likely to apply for grants under this fund and help execute the work. Still others are likely to be active members of networks that grow out of the conference. Therefore, we expect to pass the impact goal of "at least half" of members specifically engaged in the next year.
- A long-term host for the African Great Lakes Information Platform has not yet been identified, but that will happen through the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund grant-making process in the next year.
- Because the information platform was conceived as a living platform, it will never truly be finished. We expect usership to grow as the long-term host is identified through the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund grant-making process and that entity continues investments in updates and outreach regarding the site.

Were there any unexpected impacts (positive or negative)?

We were pleasantly surprised by the scale of the interest and engagement in the conference. Initially planned as a gathering of 75-150 stakeholders, in the end, the conference attracted more than 300 participants from 34 countries. This allowed for even broader exchange of ideas and information than expected. Feedback from conference participants was also overwhelmingly positive, with 96% of respondents saying they were either "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with the overall conference. Survey results are available here.

In addition, a number of stakeholders used the conference as a convenient anchor for convening side events on related topics, amplifying the impacts of the conference itself. An overview of the side meetings is included above, and a full list with details of what each gathering covered is provided here.

Media coverage also helped garner attention for some of the issues the conference aimed to address, including an article in Kenya's Daily Nation making the case for business leaders in African Great Lakes nations to support freshwater and fisheries conservation in the interest of their bottom lines, and an article in Uganda's Daily Monitor describing some of the transboundary threats to the lakes.

Finally, unrelated to this grant, the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation revised their strategic priorities and decided to end major support for the African Great Lakes Region. As part of closing out their portfolio in the region and seeding a legacy of tangible outcomes from the conference for which they also provided major support, the foundation provided a grant to TNC to administer a two-year grant-making process to fund projects that implement priorities agreed upon through the conference process. This generous gift created an unanticipated opportunity to help entities involved with the conference carry out some of the gathering's resolutions on the ground over the next couple of years, solidifying its tangible impacts.

African Great Lakes information-sharing platform. A new digital information-sharing platform, available at http://www.africangreatlakesinform.org/, was unveiled at the conference and is intended to serve as the first stop for information on conservation and sustainable development programs in the lake and river basins of Lake Albert, Lake Edward, Lake Kivu, Lake Malawi/Niassa/Nyasa, Lake Tanganyika, Lake Turkana and Lake Victoria. The site houses spatial data; information on past, present and future projects; and all aspects of adaptive management. It also includes a page dedicated to the conference which is viewable here. The site will be enhanced and maintained over the long-term by an in-region entity that will be identified through the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund grant-making process. Journal articles stemming from the conference. A series of research papers on the African Great Lakes and connected with the conference are on track to be published in future issues of three scientific journals: Fisheries Management and Ecology, The Journal of Great Lakes Research, and Lakes and Reservoirs: Research and Management. Manuscripts are not yet available.

One of the major goals of this project was to facilitate connections and capacity-building across entities working in the conservation, natural resource management, and sustainable development fields across the African Great Lakes Region. By carefully cultivating and selecting a diverse set of conference committee members, then devolving responsibility to them for designing a conference that addresses agreed-upon priority topics, the conference development process itself was a tremendous vehicle for building relationships and sharing knowledge. Having this core set of stakeholders so deeply invested in seeing their efforts succeed brought great energy and enthusiasm to the conference. It also created a natural constituency committed to continuing the collaborations begun through this process so that the conference is more than an event.Coordination of such a broad group – across multiple countries and languages – was an intense challenge, especially for TNC, being relatively new to the region and without staff based in the host country of Uganda. However, we believe the broad participation was also one of the project's greatest strengths, and one from which TNC will learn. For example, TNC Africa would dedicate more administrative and communications capacity to a project such as this before repeating it again.

Over the next year, we expect that the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund will provide a rich opportunity to continue improving the organizational capacity of TNC and partner groups as we implement priorities identified by conference stakeholders across the African Great Lakes basins. The request for concept notes has been released for the Fund and the reception has been enthusiastic within the region. Lessons from these and other projects will be shared via the new African Great Lakes information-sharing platform which will further advance our capacity-building goals.

Sustainability / Replication

As noted above, having a coalition of local stakeholders invested in conference development established a strong foundation for continued collaboration on issues identified through the conference. In addition, the unanticipated grant from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation to launch the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund generated excitement at the conference and provides a vehicle for continuation of priority work identified through the conference process. Ensuring that the African Great Lakes information-sharing platform is kept up-to-date and that it becomes the go-to site for stakeholders in the region looking for data and best practices on conservation, sustainable resource development, and related themes will be an ongoing challenge. Fortunately, the African Great Lakes Conservation Fund will provide the means to continue working toward this goal, starting by identifying a long-term local host for the site.
