The purpose of the project, in keeping with its name, is to raise the profile of the saola by spreading awareness of this remarkable animal and of its existential plight beyond the boundaries of the scientific community. It is hoped that increased public awareness will result in broadened support for saola conservation. The vehicle for spreading awareness is a book, *The Last Unicorn*, which is a direct result of this grant. *The Last Unicorn* is to be published by Little Brown & Co., a prominent New York publishing house, sometime in 2014.

The initial grant contemplated publication of magazine articles; production of a book was not guaranteed.

Describe the success or challenges of the project toward achieving its short-term and long-term impact objectives.

I don't know how to answer this question. *The Last Unicorn* is my eighth book and every book involves a long chain of successes and challenges, not the least of which is finding the money necessary to stay afloat during the long process of writing. The \$20,000 CEPF grant funded most but not all of the research phase of the book. Finding the necessary funds since then has seemed like a series of small miracles, and has depended emphatically on the success of my previous book, *A Great Aridness: Climate Change and the Future of the American Southwest.* Without this (modest) success I would not have earned the lecturing fees or the publishing advance that have kept me going.

Were there any unexpected impacts (positive or negative)?

One unexpected impact of the project was provision of a small grant from the Liz Claiborne Art Ortenberg Foundation (deBuys is on its board) to the Watershed Management Protection Authority to step up its enforcement activities in Nakai-Nam Theun National Protected Area, Khamouane Province, Lao PDR.

Other impacts, expected and unexpected, will not be known until publication of *The Last Unicorn* in 2014.
