The project:

- developed a tourism plan to encourage financing of consveration activities within the Malaklolop CCA
- developed a tourism plan for Nusmuetu Protected Area
- supported the development of new proposals to support Nusumetu Protected Area
- provided direct financial support to the development of an improved ecotrekking tour of Mount Tabwemasana
- developed and oversaw the signing of a partnership agreement between the landowners of Mount Tabwemasana and an inbound tour booking agent to ensure that benefits of tours were equitably shared and some finances went from each tour booked, directly to conservation outcomes in the Tabwemasana CCA
- provided the pathway for the Government of Vanuatu to develop an Ecotourism Certification program

In November 2019, the Sustainable Destinations Conference will be held in Santo, showcasing tourism efforts towards sustainability in Vanuatu with international as well as regional attendees. The project has been key in supporting this national progress.

Describe the success or challenges of the project toward achieving its short-term and long-term impact objectives

The project encountered a major setback in the first six months of the project when the Government of Vanuatu decided they no longer wished to pursue ecocertification through Ecotourism Australia but sought to develop their own sustainable certification program. This change in Government priority meant existing plans for the project to support the Government had to change. The project was able to reallocate funding and resources to provide more direct support to operators in the Santo Mountain Chain. The project still ran two workshops for the Government of Vanuatu through the project which focused more directly on how tourism could invest in conservation in Vanuatu. The project was able to use examples of tourism operators taking initiatives in conservation including the communities and operators working as partners on the project. While the amendment to the project was an administrative challenge, it allowed the project to target changes at the local level more effectively. The altered role of the project from creating a national mechanism to promoting opportunities for more effective relationships between the tourism sector and communities undertaking conservation turned out to be a success for the project as it raised the profile of the work being done and led to the project team being given more opportunities to further sustainable tourism in Vanuatu. This amendment meant that the short term impact "A successful Ecotourism trial on Espiritu Santo and Efate engages at least 16 tourism operators in Vanuatu leading to the design and endorsement of a national program by May 2019" became impossible. The project still engaged more

than 16 tourism operators through workshops however and through its workshops and engagement with the sector has still played a role in the project long term impact of supporting Vanuatu to "demonstrate regional leadership in the promotion of sustainable development through better environmental and social practices."

Ongoing financial support for the three target sites was a partial success. The Santo Mountain Chain has an ongoing mechanism now for financing. In the Gaua site, Dolav community, through a process of landuse planning decided to select an area for protection which falls just outside the priority KBA area. This has meant they have not secured further funding to develop tourism. Having said this, the tourism development plan has been shared with tourism operators and the area was featured in the national newspaper, the Daily Post. Opportunities to support the tourism product in Malaklolop are being sought by Live & Learn currently. Green Hill, or Nusumetu, has a new project starting to develop its tourism product. With the support of CEPF and GEF 5, Nusumetu looks like it is on track to achieve this impact and to secure its conservation status in 2020 as planned.

Were there any unexpected impacts (positive or negative)?

The relationship built between the Department of Tourism and the project team led to further contracts during the project which have had a positive impact for the development of sustainable tourism in Vanuatu. Nakau recieved a contract to develop a Code of Conduct for tourism operators working in areas of Ecological and Cultural Significance. This Code, while still in draft is intended to become mandatory for all tourism operators and assessed at the time of permit renewal (every 2 years). Nakau was able to incorporate requirements relating to interactions with priority species and behaviour within key biodiversity areas. Live & Learn Vanuatu also recieved a contract through this relationship with the Department of Tourism to develop a map of the Ecological and Culturally Significant Areas in Vanuatu. This map is currently in draft and incorporates Key Biodiversity Areas and Islandscapes. While still in draft, both these contracts will have a positive impact on the behaviours of tourism operators in areas of interest to CEPF.

The project manager for the project was also asked to present at the Forest and Landscape Restoration Conference in Nadi in May 2019 where she was able to share the project activities looking at encouraging tourism-based financing for conservation. Government stakeholders from most acific island countries were present so this was a good opportunity to encourage stronger links between tourism adn conservation in the region.

Greater flexibility in the design of the project would have been of assistance relating to the suport provided by the project to the Government of Vanuatu. The outcomes of the project were as good, if not better than originally planned but the deliverables and impacts were so specific that they became irrelevant and had to be changed.

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The costs of travel to the Santo Mountain Chain were not fully realised. While they were able to be covered due to ammendments to the project, the project was unrealisitic in what could be afforeded in its original design.

Consistency of advice from finance grants management team on how to manage exchange rates from the beginning of the project would have saved many hours of additional adminitrative work for Nakau.

Sustainability / Replication

Summarize the success or challenges in ensuring the project will be sustained or replicated, including any unplanned activities that are likely to result in increased sustainability or replicability.

It is a challenge for the sustainability of the Malaklolop CCA site is deemed outside the priority KBA, especially given the small size of the entire island of Gaua and the biodiversity found within that area. A challenge will now be to find further dunfing for this site to establish its tourism product. Mount Tabwemasana is in a strong position to maintain its leadership position in tourism-financed conservation and will recieve ongoing support. Nusumetu, will recieve further support as its scoping has just began.

The project approach of targeting the tourism sector for conservation has garnered interest from various groups, including through a Forest Landscape Restoration Conference run by FAO and the Korean Forest Service where Nakau presented the Tabwemasana case study to many Pacific island Government representatives. Further opportunities are likely to occur in supporting tourism engagement in conservation using this project as an example of early adopters.
