PROJECT RESULTS/DELIVERABLES

Overall results of the project:

1. 1772 local community members gained their understanding on importance of fishery management and endangered fish species. To increase understanding of local communities on endangered fish species, MVi has produced the video clip on endangered fish species and broadcasted via MVi facebook page. To ensure the information reached to communities, MVi dropped the video into Telegram and messenger group of communities and during the training/meeting/workshop and any events of MVi, MVi team encouraged local community to like and share page of MVi and then local communities could access what MVi broadcasted. Furthers, MVi team always promote the endangered fish species before starting the meeting/training/workshop of MVi. In this, it was also indicated that one endangered fish species (Probarbus jullieni Isok barb) have been released to conservation area. Another two fish species (04 fishes) have been released (Domrey and Khacha fish) that currently these species are rare in their community.
2. Illegal fisheries in LS2 conservation have been decreased. Two mechanism for fishery resource protect in LS2 dam conservation area were created including the first one, patrolling team that it was joined by commune police, communities representative, and FiAC have been set up under collaboration between STG FiAC and MVi. Second one, one permanence station in conservation area for guarding the illegal fisheries have been built by STG FiAC after the action from technical working group on fishery (FiAC, MVi and other NGOs in Stung Treng that working on fishery) meeting and as planned, MVi is processing on building one floating station for patrolling team. Through, these two mechanisms, 34765meters of illegal net, 13 of electric shocks, 13 batteries, 13 boats and engines, 4500meters fishing hook were cracked down and confiscated and two illegal fishery persons were sent to court.

15 of 18 persons who used the illegal fishing gears have changed their behaviors to use the traditional fishing gears and returned for community resource protection. Four villages (Nheurn, Kbal Romeas Thmey, Srea Sronuk and Khang Sper villages) were mapped that 18 families who used the illegal fishing gears. To change the behavior of 18 families, MVi has worked closely with CFis committee for all four villages to engage them into project activities like meeting/training/workshop and patrolling and always reflect with them for what cause of fish decreasing and what of community can do for increasing the fish stock in their communities. In this, CFis committee also collaborated with commune chief and commune police to explain them on punishment of using the illegal fishing and disadvantage of illegal fishing gears.

3. 13 CFis have developed the fund resource mobilization strategic plan (2022-2025) for generating the income for their CFis sustainability during the CFis reflection workshop. For example during the period of report: 387.50USD gained interest from loan providing of saving group in Sam Khouy village in 2021 while their capital increased for 30702.50USD. Srea Tapan CFI has income from member contribution for 50USD. Sdao CFI has income from boat rental and visitor whom visit the Sdao CFI for 25USD.

4. One bedding to construct the LS2 conservation boundary pole, guard floating station and patrolling boat was done in February 2021 and the committee members were came from STG FiAC official and MVi and bedding was proceeded based on MVi policy. As results, one LS2 conservation boundary pole installed, two patrolling boats were done and hand over to Kbal Romeas Thmey and Srea Kor CFis for using and management, and one floating station has done and handed over to Kbal Romeas Chas for management.

5. Four CFis (Srea Kor, Sdoa 1, Sdoa 2, and Srea Tapan) have recognized management plan from MAFF and Eight CFis in project target area have been drafted and verified with CFis members on CFI agreement between CFis and Stung Treng FiAC. In good collaboration with local authorities and STG FiAC, eight meeting to develop the draft agreement of CFis were done within report period. Eight meetings were conducted in eight villages in project target area in two districts including Sesan and Siem Pang that it was joined from STG FiAC official, commune councilors, CFIMC members, and CFis members.

Tools, products or methodologies that resulted from the project or contributed to the results:

During the project implementation, MVi has developed some tools, materials and methodologies to support for producing the project results as below:

- 1- Training manuals: To be effective of training and capacities building to CFis, MVi consulted with youths, women and CFis committee representative to develop the training manuals including gender issue analysis, biodiversity, and negotiation and facilitation skills.
- 2- Video clips: in part of documentations, MVi supported to develop the videos related to MVi grievant policy and video lessons of biodiversity, negotiation and facilitation skill.
- 3- Social media: MVi has supported CFis committee, women and youths group to develop the communication mechanism/platform. In this, one community group Telegram and messenger were created and applied.
- 4- Community fish catch guideline: To be able CFis committee members, women and youths have confidence to conduct the community fish catch monitoring, in this MVi developed the community fish catch guideline and it was provided the awareness raising to CFis committee members, youths and women group.
- 5- LS2 conservation boundary pole: To aware peoples and Cfi members on LS2 conservation boundary, MVi collaborated with STG FiAC to install the LS2 conservation boundary pole.
- 6- Patrolling boats: Two patrolling boats were supported to Srea Kor and Kbal Romeas Thmei CFis for patrolling. Two Cfis were supported with two fast boats to crack down the illegal fishing activities in their conservation area.
- 7- Floating station: One floating station was supported to Kbal Romeas Chas Cfi. Floating station was built for Cfi members guarding in their conservation area.
- 8- Gender action plan: To promote/mobilize women participate in fishery resource conservation, MVi supported the capacities building to women and youth group on gender issues analysis and developed the gender action plan. In this, 10 gender action plan were developed and implemented in 10 villages.
- 9- CFis plan: six months and annual reflection workshop were supported to CFis to organize in purpose of sharing the best practice on fishery resource conservation, build cooperation with local authorities, among CFis committee, build ownership to CFis to lead the events, and plan development.
- 10- CFis structure: 10 CFis structures were supported to develop and three CFis were re-structured by collaboration with STG FiAC and local authorities and 10 CFis structures have approved from commune chief.
- 11- CFis by-law and internal rules: 10 CFis by-laws and internal rule were supported to develop and three CFis by-law and internal rule were reviewed by collaboration with STG FiAC and local authorities and 10 CFis by-laws and internal rule were approved by commune chief.
- 12- CFis boundary map: 10 CFis boundary map were produced to identify the community conservation boundary and application for CFis recognition from MAFF.

13- CFis agreement: 07 CFis (Krabeichrum, Kbal Romeas chas, Kbal Romeas Thmei, Srea Sronuk, Nhang Sum, Khan Sper, O'Chay) agreements were drafted and verified with CFis members and one CFI (Srea Tapan) signed agreement between STG FiAC and CFiMC.

14- CFis management plan: Four CFis were recognized from FiA and implemented (Srea Kor, Sdoa 1, Sdoa 2, and Srea Tapan).

15- Signboards: 08 signboards of CFI boundary map, 03 signboards of local fish species, 13 signboards of endangered fish species, one signboard of floating station, three signboards of LS2 conservation area boundary pole were developed to provide the awareness raising to local communities on MVi grievant policy, CFI boundary, endangered fish species, local fish species that it was found by CFis.

Three Cfis (O'Rey, Smar Koh, Sdao) have confidants to conduct the fish data fish recording unless the training course were included theories and practice and adding with monitoring and coaching via phone call or field visit.

Relevant police post and provincial police asks to share documents of activities or events we need to ask them back for objectives and principle/laws of asking documents from NGOs that they are implementing in the province. Moreover, for workshop or events should be invited police representative to join to avoid effective to feeling of participants when police come the meeting room to ask the documents and take the photos.

To open space for women to join the events or activities outsider their villages, unless organizers should identify the risk of women and challenges and then set the clear risk management in the plan to manage and reducing.

Women group could play their leadership roles in fishery resource governance, unless the capacities building were provided, create simple tools for them to implementation and allocate budget for them to implement the initiative that they have included in their plans.

To mitigate anticipated or unanticipated environmental or social safeguard issues during this period, MVi has engaged local authorities and relevant stakeholders to join the project activities including the process of CFis legalization from MAFF that MVi closely collaborated with STG FiAC and local authorities all the step of CFis establishments.

Within report period, MVi has supported community fisheries to develop the signboards and installed in their villages. In the signboards, it was added the contact list of MVi, CEPF and Worldbank when community members have any comments and problems, they can report via that contact while the day of signboard installments it was mentioned of contact list.

All the activities organizing by MVi and community fisheries lead, the materials to prevent the Covid-19 outbreak have been prepared based on Ministry of Health orientation/declaration including masks and alcohols.

Annual reports and planning of MVi were shared to relevant stakeholders, provincial governor, district governors, commune councils and community fisheries for accountabilities and transparency and other one it is a part of building relationship and getting supporting

from stakeholders and local authorities. For example, annual operational plan 2022 and annual report of MVi 2021 were translated from English to Khmer and distributed to all stakeholders and governors.

To respond the requirement of Stung Treng provincial department of planning and local authorities (commune, district and provincial), MVi has produced the quarterly report and shared to them. The progress report were mentioned about key activities, number of participants including women, youths, and people with disabilities who joined the project activities and place of event. In this, the challenges and recommendation have been included to call for addressing the community needs.
