### 1. INTRODUCTION

BRC was awarded a proposal by the CEPF to implement a conservation project in the two communities of Upper Mnyameni and Cata. The project had set clear deliverables to be delivered by the end of June 2014. The project had a component of wattle clearing, planning of conservation of 4 red list species, water conservation and setting aside of 2000 ha land under conservation. The communities, based on this, negotiated a stewardship agreement with the government. As part of the project there was rehabilitation of the cleared zones through grassing and planting of indigenous trees. In order for the deliverables to be carried out BRC entered into an agreement with The Wild Bird trust. As BRC could not complete all facets of the original proposal WBT stepped in to assist. The following is a breakdown of work completed by WBT while assisting BRC and once a new agreement had been entered into with CEPF.

The Wild Bird Trust was not able to complete all project deliverables as agreed due to problems with working with the community, including the staff, of Cata. The following is an excerpt from an email sent to Wildlands Conservation Trust by our project manager at the time, Mr David Nkosi, expressing some of his issues with the community:

- 1. They had a supervisor who they have chased away, she was trying to get them to work and motivate them but clearly the other 8 are not working.
- 2. When I go to visit without announcing then I will often find those who did come to work sleeping on the clearing site, today there were 5 of them there sleeping and the other 4 nowhere to be seen. Time sheets signed for absent workers.
- 3. They are complaining that the tools we bought them last week are not sharp, the tools are brand new.
- 4. They complain that they are hurting their hands, the gloves they were issued are nowhere to be seen.

Due to the difficulty of working with the Cata Community the deliverables below were not achieved but the funding was used for the buying of trees for land rehabilitation in Hogsback as well as to secure the future of the Cape Parrot Project in Hogsback for future reforestation work by the establishment of a germination nursery.

# a. Nursery Establishment

The expected outcomes here were:

- 1) to establish 20 micro-nurseries in Cata/Upper Mnyameni and stock each with 250 trees and;
- 2) refurbish the holding nursery in Cata.

While no micro-nurseries were established in Cata or Upper Mnyameni new mirco-nurseries where established in Zingcuka (10 micro-nurseries each with 100 trees) and Sompondo (10 micro-nurseries each with 100 trees). We chose to establish the micro-nurseries in these communities as we have past relationships with both communities and see a willingness to participate from them. Due to supply from our germination nurseries we were only able to stock each micro-nursery with 100 trees but hope to increase this amount as the project moves forward.

No head-way was made with the refurbishment of the holding nursery in Cata. In early 2015 new project managers were employed and due to the issue with germination nurseries they suggested we look at building a germination nursery that is managed by the Cape Parrot Project. Purchases for this nursery were made with the budget set aside for the Cata holding nursery. Having a nursery in Hogsback ensure the projects ability to produce local trees for restoration work.

### b. Forest Reserve

The Department of Agriculture Forestry and Fisheries (DAFF) is the assessing and implementing agency for Forest Reserves in the Amathole region. We have been working closely with them on all our clearing and restoration projects and continue to have discussions with them regarding the establishment and gazetting of Forest Reserves. The process has been a long one and often one sided but in a recent meeting with DAFF we have found that it is a lack of funding to complete a comprehensive GIS mapping exercise that is prohibiting the Forest Reserves plan from moving

forward. We are currently waiting on their budget to have a GIS consultant conduct this exercise, and will subsequently seek funding in order that this mapping is completed. Furthermore, we will continue to work with DAFF to ensure the reserves get gazetted.
