The main limitation was the attendance of only one Lao member of the SWG at the meeting. All Lao members of the SWG who are associated in any way with the Lao government had to cancel their participation only about one week in advance, to stay home to attend obligatory government meetings called in preparation for the upcoming Party Congress.

Lessons Learned

The main lesson-learned was the value of getting people together, for face-to-face discussion and decision-making. Email, and even comparatively brief conference calls and Skype calls, are simply no substitute for getting people together in a room, with sufficient time to work through a focused agenda.

Also, time invested in advance in preparing the agenda, and getting it right, repays in benefits during the course of the meeting.

Project Design Process

The main thing we did well was to have a core of about six members of the SWG meet the day *before* the meeting to discuss and revise the draft agenda. This made a significant contribution to the meeting's productivity, and value.

Project Implementation

This time, we did not do very well at assigning one person (or a core of people) to record the minutes of the meeting as it progressed.

Other Lessons Learned

Mainly, for progress in a complex topic, get the right people together in a room, for discussion focused by a sharply honed agenda.
