III. NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. What was the initial objective of this project?

The initial objective for the project was to establish the Soebastfontein Succulent Karoo Reserve in order to:

- To protect the quartz patches at Soebatsfontein
- To establish alternative land use enterprise that will also serve as a model to persons currently engaging in non-sustainable land uses.
- To raise awareness in the community and among tourists about the highly vulnerable quartz fields that house numerous local endemic and habitat specialised succulent plant species
- 2. Did the objectives of your project change during implementation? If so, please explain why and how.

No, the objectives remained the same during project implementation. The issue of providing alternative land use for the communal farmers was not that much of an issue because the Soebastfontein area has enough land for grazing apart from the area targeted for conservation.

3. How was your project successful in achieving the expected objectives?

The project was partly successful in that we managed to establish the Succuleent Karoo Reserve, but we did not finish the grading of the fountain which was also a critical aspect of the project.

The reserve was successful because we managed to fence the area we targeted completely, it is now under protection, and about 200 to 300 hectares of the quartz patches are under protection.

The whole community is now fully aware of the importance of the quartz and are doing their bit to conserve.

We also managed to attract some tourists, but they come during the flower season only

4. Did your team experience any disappointments or failures during implementation? If so, please explain and comment on how the team addressed these disappointments and/or failures.

There was a little lack of experience in the team regarding project management and implementing this kind of project. During implementation, we found that the issue of training was not adequately addressed. The main difficulty was the issue of financial management and planning of activities. It was mostly a trial and error experience, but we eventually managed to get things done the way we wanted them done. But it is important that for us to move forward, we will need more training and mentoring to plan and implement our objective in a way that is financially sound and to meet deadlines. The community does not have that much experience in doing all these things, but through their will, the project was successful.

5. Describe any positive or negative lessons learned from this project that would be useful to share with other organizations interested in implementing a similar project.

Now we have the knowledge to manage and initiate projects in the community that can uplift and improve the socio-economic status of the community as well as to conserve our precious biodiversity. We gained experience in leadership as well as we had to lead the team in implementing this project.

One negative is that though the community is small, and interests might be the same as well, the community is not a homogenous group, there were always clashes. This was mainly due to tight competition for the same scarce resources; this I think is to be expected when working in a small community with limited economic opportunities. So anyone implementing a similar project should strive to broaden participation so that everybody can be on board.

6. Describe any follow-up activities related to this project.

Due to lack of funds, there is not much we can do. We would like to advertise on websites and other media institutions what we have done in Soebastfontein. We would also like to finish the fountain the grading of the fountain camp site. But with no resources, this just remains a dream now.

We feel that for future purposes, it is important for outside organizations and scientists to involve the whole community and not to perpetuate faction in the community. Ward committees and other community structures should not be over-looked and sidestepped, if agencies want to implement projects in communities, then community leaders should be very much involved in project planning and implementation. Factions and preferential treatment should be discouraged.
