LARGE GRANTS

Investment in Madagascar and the Indian Ocean Islands Hotspot: Madagascar, Seychelles, Mauritius, Comoros

 Opening Date: 5 October 2018
Closing Date: 30 November 2018 (Midnight in Antananarivo, Madagascar)
Budget & Timeframe: The minimum budget per project is US\$20,000 and the maximum budget per project is US\$200,000.

Projects are expected to start on **1 June 2019** at the earliest and must be completed by **30 June 2022**.

4. General Information

The <u>Critical Ecosystem Partnership Fund</u> (CEPF) is a joint initiative of l'Agence Française de Développement, Conservation International, the European Union, the Global Environment Facility, the Government of Japan, the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation, and the World Bank. A fundamental goal is to ensure civil society is engaged in biodiversity conservation.

The hotspot has often been considered a priority among hotspots, because of its extreme diversity—with about 15,000 plant species, of which more than 12,000 are endemic—and because of the high-level taxonomic endemism, which demonstrates distinct evolutionary mechanisms related to the isolation of the hotspot. The area also qualifies as a hotspot due to a very high level of degraded natural ecosystems, illustrated by the massive deforestation of Mauritius or Madagascar, or the disappearance of many higher vertebrates, like the dodo, which has become the symbol of species extinction. The



conservation outcomes (species, sites and corridors) represent the highest geographical priorities for biodiversity investments.

The niche and investment strategy of CEPF for the Madagascar and Indian Islands Biodiversity Hotspot were defined in a participatory manner during the development of the ecosystem profile, which brought together representatives of civil society, governments, donors and experts from all countries in the region. The CEPF Donor Council approved the ecosystem profile in 2014. The strategy of the Ecosystem Profile is broken into strategic directions, which themselves combine several investment priorities eligible for CEPF funding.

CEPF has recruited a regional implementation team (RIT), which works closely with the CEPF Secretariat, to achieve the objectives set out in the strategy. Since 2015, the Tany Meva Foundation has assumed the role of RIT for the Madagascar and Indian Islands Hotspot. The RIT supports civil society organizations in identifying and preparing project proposals, supporting them throughout the implementation of the project, and facilitating replication and scaling up of experiences.

5. Eligible Applicants

Nongovernmental organizations, community-based organizations, private enterprises, universities, and civil society organizations can apply for funding.

Government-owned enterprises or institutions are eligible only if they can demonstrate that the enterprise or institution has:

- A legal personality independent of any government agency or actor;
- The authority to apply for and receive private funds; and
- May not assert a claim of sovereign immunity.

Applicants must have their own bank account and be authorized under relevant national laws to receive charitable contributions.

Applicants may submit their LOI as a consortium of partners. In this instance, one leading organization should be identified, and the roles and added contributions of the different partners should be detailed.



6. Eligible Activities

The scope of this call is limited to the types of activities described in **strategic directions 1,2 and 3** of the ecosystem profile and their associated **investment priorities**:

8. Application Process

All applications must be submitted through the **ConservationGrants** website via this link:

Access to ConservationGrants

CEPF will under exceptional circumstances only, and with prior approval only, accept LOIs by email or any other mechanism.

Applications are welcome in **French** and **English**.

Upon completion of your application, you will receive an email acknowledgement from the **ConservationGrants** system confirming that the submission has been received.

Applicants who do not have a **ConservationGrant**s portal account will need to register a new account. Open an account by clicking on the blue "New User?" link underneath the 'Sign in' box.

Existing **ConservationGrants** users can use the same login information and create a new LOI.

Questions regarding account creation or regarding the **ConservationGrants** application process should be emailed to <u>conservationgrants@conservation.org</u>.

The LOI review process will takes a few weeks from the deadline date. All applicants will receive a response from CEPF following the review of their proposed project. Applicants whose LOIs receive a positive review will be invited to submit a full proposal through the **ConservationGrants** electronic portal. Full proposals will need to be received by the CEPF Secretariat on a date specified by the grant director.

Full proposals that receive a positive review will lead to the award of a grant between Conservation International, as the host of the CEPF Secretariat, and the applicant's institution (the "grantee"). Grants will be denominated in United States dollars and grant agreements will be in English, with a French version also available.



9. General Advice and Contacts

Project proposals should be built on biodiversity conservation as a fundamental component and should demonstrate positive impacts on the conservation status of biodiversity.

Where relevant, applicants are encouraged to submit LOIs which harmonize with existing national or regional initiatives. CEPF encourages applicants to develop joint proposals with organizations from different sectors to respond to the need for a multi-sectoral and/or multi-regional approach where relevant. In particular, fishermen or farmers' organizations; the tourism industry associations; and experts in biodiversity and encouraged to come together to build partnerships.

Applicants are strongly encouraged to discuss their project ideas with relevant stakeholders and organisations that are already implementing activities in a given KBA, in order to ensure complementarity.

10. Evaluation of Letters of Inquiry

• Evaluation of LOIs shall be made according to the following guidelines:

Criteria of eligibility for the applicant and the overall proposal (budget amount, project timeframe, etc.) is in line with this call.

- The LOI is convincing and the project has been well-thought-through and is clearly presented.
- The proposed activities are likely to generate sustainable results and impacts, beyond the period of performance/financing of the project.
- Complementarity with existing projects in a given area has been considered.
